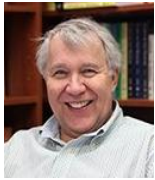




Workers' Compensation and Poverty: What does the Research Show?

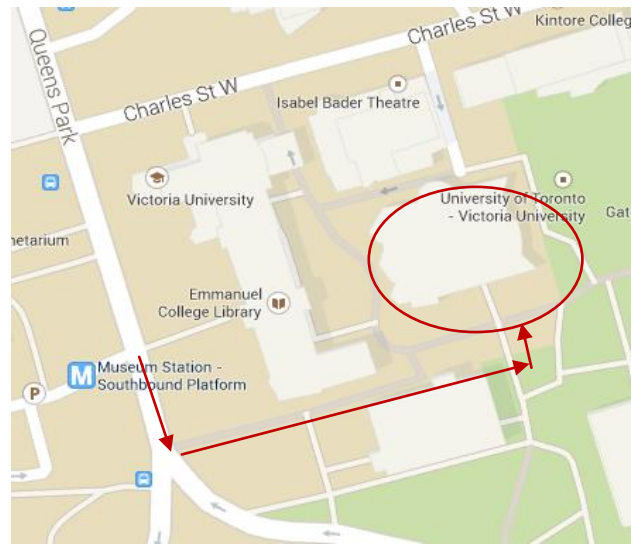
