Over the past year, Memorial University's Employment Equity and Diversity Advisory Committee (EEDAC) has been guiding the development of a new three-year Employment Equity and Diversity Plan for the university. As a part of this process, they held open consultations with stakeholders both internal and external to the university in order to gain better insight into how Memorial might attract and retain more diverse employees, including those with disabilities. The plan will be submitted to the Memorial Vice-Presidents Council for approval this fall. Once it is approved, EEDAC will review annual status reports with respect to progress of the Employment Equity and Diversity Plan and provide appropriate advice.

- II. Dr. Tompa, Co-Director of the CRWDP, is a member of the Labour Market Information Council's National Stakeholder Advisory Panel (NSAP).
